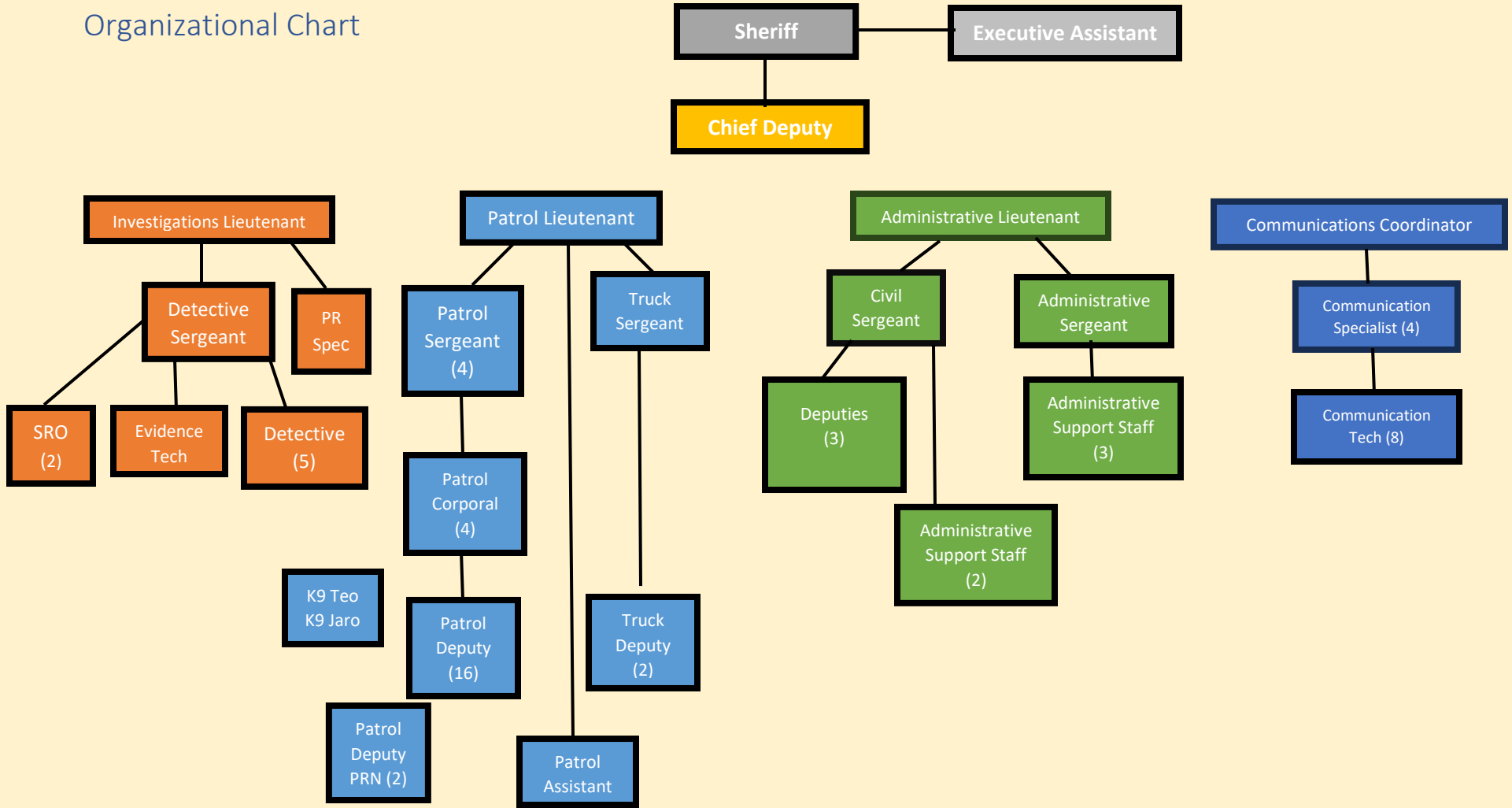

Every month the **McKenzie County Communications Center** receives 15 evaluations by a third-party quality assurance program, Moetivations.

The evaluations consist of a trained evaluator listening to actual phone calls and evaluating the call takers line of questioning, professionalism, collection of pertinent information, and more. Moetivations follows the national guidelines set in place by APCO and NENA.

Law Enforcement Contracts

McKenzie County Sheriff's Office currently provides dedicated law enforcement services to both the City of Alexander and the City of Arnegard.

The City of Alexander entered into an agreement with the Sheriff's Office in 2016 which requires 10 hours of contracted patrol services to the city per week.

The City of Arnegard entered into an agreement with the Sheriff's Office in 2020 which requires 10 hours of contracted patrol services to the city per week.

Deputies routinely enforce city ordinances like parking and animal complaints while working closely with the city administration to address any other needs that are identified. Outside of contracted patrol hours, the Sheriff's Office responds to other calls for service like medical emergencies, disturbances and theft complaints.

U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) – Forest Service has also partnered with the Sheriff's Office to provide extra patrol focused toward fire emergencies, drug enforcement and group gatherings occurring in the Dakota Prairie Grasslands located in McKenzie County.

Civil and Criminal Process

The Sheriff's Office is responsible for serving and executing legal court-issued documents in addition to various civil papers in accordance with NDCC 11-15-04 and NDCC 11-15-06. A service fee and/or mileage must also be charged according to NDCC 11-15-07. The various fees are set forth by state law. The mileage rate is set by the McKenzie County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) and is currently \$1.00 per mile.

The various types of documents served include warrants, subpoenas, small claims, orders to show cause, summons and complaints, evictions, protection orders, civil judgement executions and wage garnishments. Once service is complete, the deputy must complete a "Sheriff's Return," which is an affidavit acknowledging and verifying who, when and where service was completed.

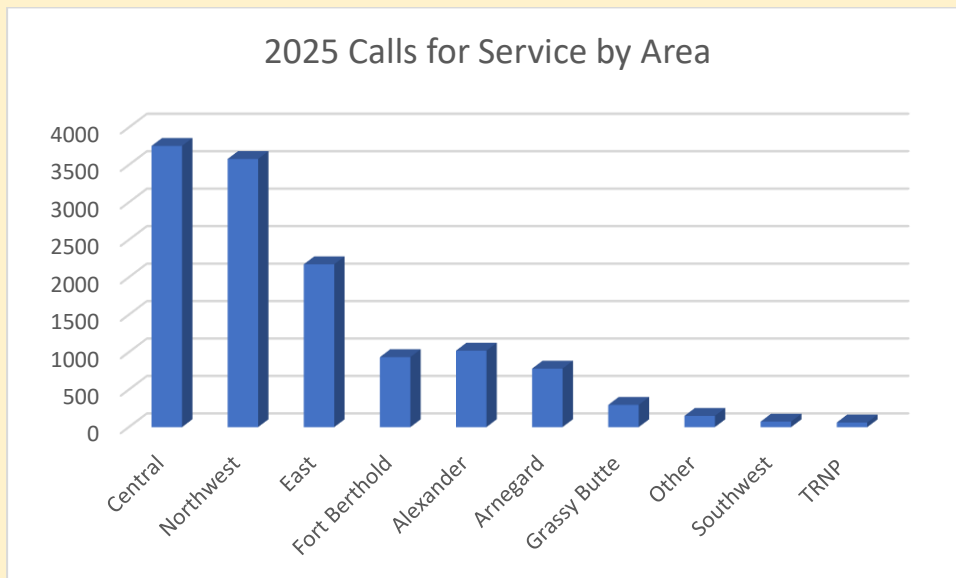

Calls for Service

Calls for Service (CFS) are calls, events or information reported by the public that require the agency to investigate, resolve or assist. A CFS can also be self-generated by a law enforcement officer, for example, a traffic stops or assisting a motorist. Once a CFS is initiated, the communications center then provides the information to the required deputies via radio communication.

Calls for Service are generally short reports for minor events or incidents like a motorist assist, welfare check, medical call, etc. These reports typically contain a short narrative and information from the deputy as to the actions taken. A Call for Service is required prior to initiating a Case Report.

Case Reports and Offenses

A case report is generally created when a crime has been committed, an arrest is made, a death has occurred or when a motor vehicle crash is reported. All case reports initially begin as a Call for Service (CFS).

Case Reports typically contain several pages of detailed information which includes suspect, victim and witness information, description of the crime or incident that occurred, type and value of property involved and any other pertinent information to the case. The case report can also include photographs, video and audio recordings along with written statements that were received.

The process of investigating a crime and completing a case report can vary greatly. They can be completed in as little as one hour or as long as several months, depending on the type of incident that occurred.

The Sheriff's Office uses the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) from the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) to report offenses/crimes that occur in McKenzie County. Each offense belongs to one of three categories: Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property or Crimes Against Society.

Below is a breakdown of offenses that have occurred in McKenzie County in the past year along with the number of cases the agency created during that time. Also listed is a breakdown of arrestee detail including sex and race.

Vehicle Crash Reports

When a crash occurs on a public road and involves a fatality, injury or at least \$4,000 in property damage, the incident must be reported to law enforcement immediately. The Sheriff's Office does not assign fault when investigating crashes, however, it is investigated and if possible, determined, if any laws were violated.

All reportable crashes are reported to North Dakota Department of Transportation (DOT) and they are deemed to be the record holder for that report. To retrieve a copy of a reportable crash report online, an involved or interested party must contact the North Dakota Department of Transportation. Crash reports can be retrieved at the following website:

If a crash involves an animal or causes less than \$4,000 in property damage, the report is not considered reportable to the DOT and the Sheriff's Office may be the record holder for the report. To request a copy of the report, contact McKenzie County Sheriff's Office.

When an individual is deemed to have violated the laws, they may be issued a citation. Citations can be issued for minor offenses like speed violations or serious violations like assault on a peace officer. The Sheriff's Office is amending the procedure for documenting citations and foresee these numbers to change slightly in the next few months due to more accurate recording.

Truck Enforcement

Truck Enforcement Division is an advanced directive position branching from the Sheriff's Office patrol division that consists of one sergeant and two deputies. Truck Enforcement Deputies are responsible for enforcing the laws, county road restrictions and federal motor carrier regulations and weight enforcement is necessary to prevent further damage to the roadways and damage to other vehicles using the roadways.

The Sheriff's office operates under the North Dakota Highway Patrol's Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program (MCSAP) and Federal Motor Carrier Inspection's when conducting Federal DOT Inspections on commercial motor vehicles (CMVs). These Federal DOT Inspections are aimed to reduce the number and severity of crashes involving CMVs. The MCSAP's mission is to improve safety for Drivers, vehicles and roads.

Offender Registration

The Sheriff's Office is responsible for registering all sexual offenders and offenders with crimes against children residing in McKenzie County and forward that information to the North Dakota Attorney General's Office. After their initial registration, any change of address, school enrollment, employment or vehicle information must be reported to our office and a new registration completed. The North Dakota Attorney General's Office is responsible for assigning the offenders a risk level (low, medium or high) after they have been properly evaluated. An offender may have a risk level listed as 'undetermined' while their evaluation is pending.

24/7 Drug and Alcohol Sobriety Program

The 24/7 Sobriety Program is utilized statewide and is governed by the North Dakota Attorney General's Office. The 24/7 program is funded entirely by the participants who are required to pay for their participation in the program as order by the courts.

Defendants appearing in District Court for a matter involving alcohol or drugs may be ordered to participate in the program as a condition of their bond while their case is pending or as a probation requirement if they are found guilty and their criminal case is complete.

The fees are as follows:

Drug Patch - \$60.00 per drug patch which is changed every 1-2 weeks and sent to an out of state laboratory to be analyzed.

Urine Analysis - \$5.00 per test.

SCRAM Bracelet - \$6.00 per day to wear the bracelet. There is also a \$25.00 activation fee and a \$25.00 deactivation fee.

Preliminary Breath Test (PBT) - \$1.00 per breath test which is conducted twice daily at the Sheriff's Office between 8:00 am - 9:00 am and 8:00 pm - 9:00 pm.

Fingerprinting Services

The Sheriff's Office provides fingerprint services to the general public for those that are required to have a state or federal background check completed for specific purposes. This includes individuals working at daycare centers, foster parent providers, school personnel, federal employment, concealed weapon permits and nursing licenses. The fee to be fingerprinted is \$20.00. All fees collected are deposited into the county's general fund.

Grant Funding

The Sheriff's Office applies for numerous grants each year to help offset the cost of overtime, training and equipment. Grant funding often comes from the federal and state level.

The Bulletproof Vest Program is through the Department of Justice and allows the agency to purchase ballistic vests and receive reimbursed for 50% of the cost of the vest. Each ballistic vest purchased is approximately \$1,750.00 each and expires after five years. Deputies are individually measured so that a ballistic vest fits appropriately allowing the most protection.

Security for Various Special Events

North Dakota Century Code 53-02-08 requires that law enforcement is present for dances, music festivals or public concerts that are open to the public. The number of deputies required at these types of events is determined by the Sheriff. The cost of providing the deputy is paid by the person or organization hosting the event and paid directly to McKenzie County at a current rate of \$75.00 per hour. The fees must be paid prior to the dance, music festival or public concert.

The Sheriff's Office also provides services above and beyond average patrolling for large incidents requiring long term assistance. The business or organization is billed directly for these incidents and pay is determined on the services and equipment provided.

Budget Information

The approved budget for the Sheriff's Office includes funding for employee salaries and benefits, uniforms, vehicle expenses, fuel and vehicle equipment, training requirements, office equipment and supplies, support of various public relations and outreach programs. The approved budget for Dispatch includes funding for employee salaries and benefits, radio expenses, training requirements and office equipment and supplies.

The approved budget can be amended with the approval of the McKenzie County BOCC. Any overages noted in the budget years receive the proper approval from the BOCC in the form of an amendment. The amendments are not reflected in our year end balance shown below. Any remaining funds at the end of each year is returned to the County's General Fund.
